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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Smt. Akkatai Ramgonda Patil Kanya Mahavidyalaya, Ichalkaranji is established in 1984 to provide quality education to the rural girl students. The institute is permanently affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur and it is recognized by UGC under Section 2(f) & 12(B) of the UGC Act 1956. It is reaccredited for 3rd cycle with CGPA 2.57, Grade B+ by NAAC. Shri Swami Vivekananda Shikshan Sanstha, Kolhapur is the parent institute of our college. It disseminates education through 409 branches in Maharashtra and some part of Karnataka. Most of the branches are situated in remote and slum area to impart education to deprived sections in the society. The college is located in Ichalkaranji which is known as Manchester of Maharashtra because of its widespread textile manufacturing industry. Therefore, majority of students of our college belongs to working class in textile industry. Dr. Bapuji Salunkhe alias Govindrao Dnyanojirao Salunkhe, a visionary educationist and freedom fighter, founded the Sanstha in 1954. "Education for Knowledge, Science and Culture" is the motto of the Sanstha. Five Principles of truth, modesty, honesty, sacrifice and eradication of instinct of exploitation are given in Sanstha Prayer written by Dr. Bapuji Salunkhe. Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Smt. Akkatai Ramgonda Patil Kanya Mahavidyalya, Ichalkaranji run by Shri Swami Vivekanand Shikshan Sanstha Kolhapur, is permanently affiliated to the Shivaji University, Kolhapur and to align with vision, it is imparting multidisciplinary knowledge through Arts and Commerce faculties at UG and Commerce at PG level. The institution is prepared for implementation of NEP 2020, by emphasizing multidisciplinary education through 9 UG and 1 PG program that reveal multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary relevance. At UG level, in addition to B.A. and B.Com., the college is having add on and skill-oriented courses such as Basic Beauty Culture and Therapy, Course in Translation, Library Management, Stress Management and Technique etc. It bears the courses of various disciplines. Apart from these courses, students are promoted to complete online courses for interdisciplinary approach. Being an affiliated college, during current academic year, as per guidelines of Shivaji University, Kolhapur, the NEP-2020 is implemented in the college for UG and PG programs. As per structure, it comprises Discipline specific Major, Minor, Open Elective, Research methodology, R&D Project, On-Job Training and internship as well, which realizes multidisciplinary relevance. As per the statutes of Government of Maharashtra and regulations of affiliating university, the college is implementing NEP for all UG Programs as well. The college has well prepared for introduction of all verticals such as DSC, OE, IKS, RP, OJT, VEC, CC etc of NEP, wherein students may opt for interdisciplinary courses to obtain requisite credits This is also enabled with Multiple Entry & Multiple Exit policy of NEP and facilitated to exit at the end of 1st, 2nd and 3rd year.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The University has introduced NEP (CBCS) from the academic year 2022-2023, wherein accumulation and redemption of academic credits are primarily emphasized. To ensure this, Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) must be opened by all students. University is an official member of the National Academic Depository (NAD), which offers an online repository for all academic awards under the Digital India Programme. As per University directions, the college has taken initiatives to open ABC accounts by login to the https://nad.gov.in/. During academic

year 2022-23 and 2023-24, the ABC accounts of admitted students are opened and record is submitted to the university. The college level NEP 2020 committee looks after the ABC of the students. As per NEP, the student can opt for Multiple-Entry Multiple-Exit (MEME) scheme for 2nd and 3rd year with certificate, diploma and degree by redemption of obtained credits. The college has ABC committee with a Nodal Officer who verifies and manages the ABC account of the students at the time admission. The committee attends the workshops organized by University regarding the ABC. To create awareness among the students, the class-wise workshops were arranged, wherein the issues such as what is ABC, Importance of ABC, Accumulation of the credits and Redemption as and when needed, demonstration of procedure of opening of the ABC accounts, submission of details of ABC accounts to the college etc are discussed. The issues of ABC are also discussed in the meeting of Admission Committee and necessary decisions are taken regarding opening of the ABC account of each student.

3. Skill development:

One of the prominent objectives of NEP is to provide skill based education to the students. To keep pace with this, the institution has already introduced 48 certificate courses through various departments of the College. These are add-on courses. Therefore, it is properly integrated with main stream of education. In addition to this, the Certificate Course in Modi Lipi (Modi Script) approved by Shivaji University, Kolhapur are introduced in the college. The selffunded certificate courses such as Yoga and Meditation, Proof Reading, Making Cake & Pastries, Mehndi Design Course, Jewellery Making, Aari Work etc. are offered for students to develop different skills among them. Apart from this, to provide skill based and job oriented education, the college has signed MoUs with Patanjali Center, Soundarya Beauty Parler, Rachana Udyog Samuha, Future Pro, Ichakaranji, Egale Spokan English Academy, Anuhira Mahila Gruhudyog, Ichalkaranji. Different activities have been organized under these active MoUs and the skills such as communication, Yoga, making paper flower & Bouquet etc are tried to inculcate skills among the students. As per the guidelines of the University, values based selflearning courses 'Democracy Elections and Good

Governance, Introduction to constitution of India & Local Governance and Environmental Studies are introduced. This value based courses emphasize the development of humanistic, ethical and constitutional values among the students. The college has introduced English communication skill as AEC course for UG program. The students are encouraged to register for NPTEL, SWAYAM the online courses.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The College is integrating the Indian Knowledge System in the curriculum of NEP from academic year 2024-25 as per the guidelines of the Shivaji University, Kolhapur. There are three language Departments which offer UG programmes namely Marathi, Hindi, and English. The college has a provision of vernacular languages like Marathi & Hindi. Curriculum of the programs reveals integration of Indian Knowledge System, teaching in vernacular languages in particular. Most of the courses of Arts and Commerce faculty (B.A., B.Com. and M.Com.) are being taught in bilingual mode (English and Marathi). Even though the medium of instruction for M.Com. is English, the vernacular language Marathi is used for the better understanding of the basic concepts. The social science courses such as History, Sociology, Economics, Political Science and Psychology are taught in bilingual mode. The 'National Hindi Day' and 'Marathi Bhasha Conservation Week' are celebrated and activities such as Poetry Recitation, Group Discussion, Essay writing etc. are organized for the development of Indian Languages. For the preservation of regional language Modi Lipi (an old Devnagari script) is being taught in the college. In order to preserve Indian culture and traditions various activities such as Poster Presentation, Rangoli, Mehendi, Quiz, dance, Traditional Day, Dandiya Utsav, Zimma-Phugadi, classical singing etc are organized. Social science departments organise study tours to Historical museums, forts to study Indian Arts, tradition and culture. Yoga is an ancient way to learn and understand the spiritual India. It is also associated with the culture and heritage of India. The college also runs a certificate course in Yoga and Meditation. Home Science Department of the college attempts to inculcate Indian Food Culture, Aari Work and Saree Ornamentation among the girl students.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome based education is one the themes of NEP

2020. Being an affiliated college of Shivaji University, Kolhapur, it is mandatory to implement the Syllabus designed by the respective Board of studies. The Program outcomes (POs), Course outcome (COs) and programme specific outcomes (PSOs) are well defined. To ensure OBE, the College has developed and implemented a dedicated module based on 'Quantitative & Qualitative Method' for evaluation of attainment of COs and mapping with POs for all courses. Each department is instructed to choose 20% students of the total outgoing students in a program and checklist of questions based on POs and Cos provided to fill. Marks in the checklist are added to the percentage gained by those students in the university examination, and later total is divided by 2. A dedicated policy is made and accordingly procedure of evaluation of CO is done. These outcomes are discussed with students at the initiation of the courses. Students are made aware of the various course outcomes, and program-specific outcome through the curriculum and orientation program. The faculties monitor the fulfillment of the outcomes through frequent interactions with the students and by organizing tests, question-answer sessions and summative examinations. Moreover, the OBE is realized while implementing the verticals of NEP such as Seminars, Tutorials, Workshops, On-Job Training, R & D Project, field work, and research work etc.

6. Distance education/online education:

The college has introduced NEP 2020 from academic year 2022-2023. Moreover, during pandemic period the college has subscribed ZOOM for online teaching. Apart from this, the stakeholders have availed other platforms of online teaching. In postpandemic phase college has decided to focus on blended learning. As a result most of the classrooms and seminar halls are made ICT enabled for teaching learning process. The College has Distance Education Centre of Shivaji University, Kolhapur which facilitates to the students from the rural area of Ichalkaranji. The college adopted online mode education through live lectures, demonstrations using various online platforms like Zoom Google Meet, Webex etc. Some of our faculties have started You Tube channels. During the pandemic situation, the college successfully conducted online examination for all programmes using licensed Biyani software.

- The college has electoral literacy club. The college comes under 288- Ichalkaranji Electoral Assembly. It functions to create awareness regarding voting by organizing different programs and events.

- As per Kolhapur District Collector's (District Election Commissioner) letter, the campaign for registration of students above 18 years who were yet to be enrolled as voters in the electoral roll was launched in the college in 2021. • ELCs are represented by teachers and students of various social categories and gender. • Students' Coordinator and Coordinating faculty members are appointed by the College as follows: 1. Dr. Manoj Jadhav, (Nodal Officer) 2. Dr. Dhiraj Shinde, (Coordinating faculty Member) 3. Miss Siddhi Khandekar, B.A-I (Member) 4. Miss Saniya Mujawar, B.A-II (Member) 5. Ms. Vaishanvi Magadum, B.A-III (Member) 6. Gargi Keshrwani, M.Com-I (Member) 7. Miss Sanjana Shinde, B.Com.-III (Member) • All these Members of ELCs work in association to perform awareness programmes and voter registration activities.
- 3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.
- •The electoral process is an essential part of the democratic system of the country. It is very important to create awareness among the students about their rights as voters and encouraging more people in the society to participate in the voting process impartially and fearlessly through the students. With this view, a Literacy Club has been established in the college. Electoral Literacy Club (ELCs) has been instrumental in fostering a culture of democratic participation and ethical voting practices among students and communities. Innovative programs and initiatives are carried out under this club. • College plays vital role in voter registration, voter awareness and inculcation of constitutional values among the students. • NSS and NCC students voluntarily participate in the ground-level election process for awareness regarding the elections. • Students are made aware to register their names voluntarily in the electoral. • Voter awareness board is displayed at the entry of the

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

- The institution is permanently affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur.
- Institution follows the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating University.
- However, faculty members of the college are the members of various bodies and authorities of the University such as Board of Studies, syllabus sub-committees etc. They are significantly contributing in design and development of the curriculum.
- University notifies the tenure of semester and accordingly IQAC plans curriculum enhancement
 programmes via a well-structured academic calendar, wherein curricular, co-curricular activities,
 extra-curricular activities, schedule of internal evaluation etc are introduced. Time Table
 Committee frames general time table for the college and accordingly the departmental time table
 is prepared.
- During the COVID-19 pandemic, IQAC prepared a timetable for online teaching. Accordingly, the departments conducted online classes through platforms like Google Meet, Zoom, etc. in 2020-21.
- Heads of departments distribute the workload among the faculty. At the beginning of each semester, a meeting is held in each department for distribution of the work. Head of the Department, with unanimous discussion, distributes the curriculum among faculty members. In additions to the curriculum, responsibilities of various other proposed activities such as arrangement of educational tour, internal evaluation, COs of respective courses, university examination, undertaking of projects, research related work, preparation of documentation etc are also distributed. In this meeting use of teaching, learning and evaluation methodologies have been discussed.
- Academic plan is prepared and maintained by the teacher and monitored by head of the department. The curriculum delivery is well planned. For effective delivery of the curriculum, the teachers are informed to avail various teaching aids for demonstrations of concepts, screening of videos and simulations of mechanisms as well.
- The faculties are also encouraged to organize and attend university level syllabus related university centre workshops. The faculties follow a well-structured teaching strategy to facilitate conducive environment in learning.
- Attempt to achieve the objectives and outcomes (COs, PSOs and POs) through the use of a variety of teaching methods; traditional, student-centric and innovative, including ICT tools. The Departmental meetings are held periodically to review the progress. If required, additional lectures are also engaged to complete the curriculum well in time.
- At the end of every semester, syllabus completion report is submitted to the Principal through Head of the department. To ensure Continuous Internal Evaluation, department wise classroom tests are conducted. Results of internal evaluation are helpful to examine progress of both slow

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- and advanced learners. The study materials such as notes, reference books, question bank and model question papers etc are made available for the student.
- Along with University level Term End Examinations, the college conducts the Formative Tests like home assignments, project work and mock practical examinations are also conducted. Results are analyzed and displayed on the notice board and also utilized for evaluation of attainment of COs and mapping of the same with POs.
- The Principal arranges departmental meetings and discusses the university results and its improvements.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

The curriculum of Shivaji University, Kolhapur ensures the integration of cross-cutting issues such as Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values, Professional Ethics etc. Moreover, it is also reflected in the curriculum of certificate courses and various activities and programmes.

- Teachers on the Board of Studies and syllabus subcommittees have been made efforts to include them in the curriculum.
- The feedback committee takes suggestions from stakeholders regarding the inclusion of the issues and forwards them to the respective BoS.

Professional Ethics:

The curriculum of the subjects such as Economics, Political Science, Hindi, Psychology, Home Science, Sociology etc bear the issues of professional ethics. Skills such as interview skills, media writing, group behavior, team work, manners and etiquettes at work place etc are directly reflected in course "English for communication". Importance of group work and imbibing leadership are taught through Wall Paper publications, Group Projects, Competitions, etc. The Syllabi of Certificate courses such as Basic Beauty Culture and Therapy, Account Executive and Tally Prime & GST include ethical principles and concerns. Apart from this Workshops organised on 'Creating & Developing E-Resources- YouTube &

Blog' and 'Career in Banking, Railway & Central Government' provides the same.

Gender Equality:

The Gender issue is integrated with the units of curriculum of the subjects such as Political Science, History, Sociology, English, Marathi, Hindi, Psychology and home science etc. A topic on Feminism is included in the syllabus of B.A.-III Political Science. The course "Gender and Violence" of B.A.II Sociology realizes the integration of Gender issues. NSS and NCC units have organized awareness rally on the theme of *Beti Bachav*.

Workshop on 'Self Consciousness to Social Consciousness', invited talk on 'Bhartiya Savidhan aani Mahila', Health & HB Check-up camp, Eye Check-up Camp and Self-Defense Judo-Karate Training are conducted for girl students.

Human Values:

Human values are reflected in the curriculum of various UG courses such as Hindi, Marathi, Psychology, Sociology and Economics, English, Political Science etc. The topics on Philosophy of Indian Constitution are included in curriculum of Political Science. The human values are integrated in the course English for Communication. The novels *The Guide* and *Animal Farm* in the curriculum of English ensure integration of Human Values. The poems like *Ajib Si Mushkil* and *Paidal Aadami* help to inculcate human values

Environment and Sustainability:

The issue Environment and sustainability is integrated in the curriculum of Geography. One of the courses B.A. III Political Science is "Environmentalism" devoted for the same. Environment Day is celebrated. NSS and NCC students participate in tree plantation and cleanliness programs. A mandatory course on Environmental studies is included for second year of all UG programmes, wherein environment related field project are emphasized. As a part of environmental concern the college has been practicing No Vehicle Day on Third Friday of every month and recycling the waste.

The college supports teachers to participate in professional development programs to develop the strategies for integrating them into curriculum and to find better methods of teaching. This ensures teachers are well-equipped to facilitate interdisciplinary learning experiences.

The institution implements student-centric methods for enhancing the lifelong learning skills.

Efforts to enhance learning experiences using ICT tools by the institution:

• Use of ICT in two phases:

In pre-pandemic phase, use of ICT was limited to broadcasting study material and e-notes. E-content consists of PPTs and slides, screening of videos, and downloaded and faculty-made videos.

After pandemic phase, timetables for conducting online classes were prepared. Social media and departmental blogs were used for communication. Platforms like Google Meet, Webex and Zoom were used for online teaching.

- To ensure better internet connectivity plan of 100 Mbps is subscribed.
- The ICT based tools installed in the seminar halls are made available for workshops, seminars and conferences. The ICT facility usually availed for screening.
- The library is regularly updated with online resources such as INFLIBNET, N-LIST etc. The e-books and journals are available which enhances learning ability of students.
- Use of Google Classroom, Google Meet, Google Forms and WhatsApp to systemize online teaching-learning and evaluation, to strengthen record-keeping and follow-up process, and to shift towards virtual learning and hybrid mode of teaching.
- Creation of YouTube channel is done by some faculty members so that students can learn at their own pace.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

- The college is having Examination Committee chaired by Principal and Coordinated by one senior teacher. It follows the procedure laid down by the policy. The committee governs CIE, University level internal and End Semester Examinations (ESE) of both UG and PG programs.
- The assessments of College Level Examinations, CIE and College Assessment (CA) are carried out in the college as per the policy defined.
- For University Assessment (UA), as per rules and regulations of Shivaji University, the Central Assessment Programme (CAP) is arranged. Complete transparency is emphasized in these assessment processes.
- Question paper set by the university and sent to college through Secured Remote Paper Delivery system (SRPD) at the time of examination. Whole process is transparent under the control of university.
- Affiliating University provides semester wise time table for summative evaluation and the institution strictly follows the same.
- Examination Committee prepares schedule for conducting Continuous Internal Examinations (CIE) and as per rules and regulation of affiliating university, the schedule for the End Semester Examination (ESE) theory and practical examinations of Part–I and Part-II of UG Programs. After assessment the results are communicated to the University well in time.
- For Internal Evaluation, the college conducts Unit Tests, Home assignments, Internal Examinations, Seminar, Project Work, Group Discussions, Oral Examinations etc.
- The score obtained in internal evaluation and university level ESE is used for evaluation of attainment of COs of all programs.

Mechanism for redressal of grievances related to both CA as well as UA examinations is transparent and time bound.

Redressal of grievances at College level Assessment (CA):

- There is an Examination Grievances Committee in the college, which supervises the process of internal examination and assessment. Grievances of students regarding internal examination are dealt with the concerned department. Complete transparency is maintained in the continuous internal evaluation process. For semester examination of Part–I and II of all UG programs, the grievances if any are addressed at the college by Examination Grievances Committee and resolved in its meeting.
- As per policy the grievances are addressed and redressed in time bound.

Redressal of grievances at University level Assessment (UA):

- There is an Examination Committee at college level, which looks after the grievances.
- The university has formulated the rules and regulations for the grievances in evaluation. After declaration of the results, the schedule for revaluation provided by the university is conveyed to students
- The students can even ask for the photo copies of their answer books on payment of required fees with the university. On receiving the photo copy of answer book, the concerned teacher reassesses the answer book and if there is justifiable grievance of the students, then the student is asked to apply for the reassessment of the answer book to the university. University appoints dedicated examiner for the reassessment and change if any will be conveyed to the students immediately through the college.

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Moreover, University level grievances committee also addresses the grievances regarding students` misconduct in examinations.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

- The Institution follows the curriculum designed by the affiliating university. The Institution believes in outcome based education process emphasized by the UGC as well.
- POs, PSOs, and COs are displayed on the college website. POs are displayed on boards at college premises while PSOs are displayed in respective departments.

Role of College in Framing POs, PSOs, and COs

- Program Outcomes are framed by the IQAC in tune with university outcomes.
- Departments prepare PSOs for respective programs in consultation with IQAC.
- PSOs are framed in specific subjects aligning them with the objectives of the units in the curriculum.
- Some college teachers are members of BOS and syllabus Sub-Committees who contribute to framing curriculum and its objectives and learning outcomes.
- The college has organized four university-sponsored workshops on Revised Syllabus in which valuable suggestions on PSOs are provided by the college teachers. Students also are encouraged to attend them so that they can understand the objectives of syllabus explained by the subject experts.
- Teachers are also asked to attend workshops on Revised Syllabus organized by the university and participate in the discussion, providing inputs on objectives and outcomes of program.
- Teachers are deputed for orientation and refresher programs and FDP to arm themselves, which is useful for communication of PSOs and COs.
- Feedback mechanism ensures the communication of feedback by various stakeholders on the current curriculum, envisioning changes in the upcoming curriculum.
- Course Outcomes of self-designed courses are framed by the concerned BOS.

Communication of POs, PSOs and COs

• At the beginning of the academic year, the college organizes an orientation cum Induction

- Programme for newly admitted students in which the teachers talk about the objectives and outcomes of the subject.
- The Head of the department discusses the POs and COs in departmental meetings well before the commencement of each semester. The required co-curricular and extracurricular activities are planned accordingly. These activities are later shared with the students.
- Departments put Program Specific Outcomes on the boards in the departments. These boards are displayed in such a way that students can easily notice them. Students discuss these outcomes among themselves in informal meetings and recess time.
- Teachers prepare their Teaching and Evaluation plan based on COs. Teachers share these objectives with students in their classrooms.
- Students' participation in field visits, industrial visits, study tours, students' projects, etc. is an effective way of comprehension of learning outcomes.
- Mentors discuss PSOs and COs with mentees in meetings and communication.
- Departments conduct several programs and activities under Lead College scheme. These activities are organized keeping view of POs, PSOs, and COs. Students participating in these activities make them aware of the relationship between objectives of these activities and PSOs and COs.
- Outcomes related to cross-cutting issues are transacted in the classroom activities.
- Departments design user-friendly blogs for communication of outcomes.
- Outcomes of career-oriented courses are also displayed on the boards in the departments.

Attainment of POs and COs are evaluated.

Response:

To ensure outcome based education in the college, the attainment of Course Outcomes (COs), mapping with Programmes Outcomes (POs) and Programme Specific Outcome (PSOs) are evaluated by the college.

Evaluation of PSOs:

- This is quantitative method designed by the IQAC in which the level of attainment is calculated using a formula.
- Each department is instructed to choose 20% students of the total outgoing students in a program.
- The checklist is provided to the department for qualitative assessment of these students.
- Questions in the checklist are prepared considering the PSOs and COs.

- The checklist contains 10 questions, each carrying 10 marks pertaining to the attainment of knowledge, skills, and attitudes gained by the students of respective specialization.
- The evaluator collectively gave marks to each student, considering his/her performance throughout the year.
- Marks in the checklist are added to the percentage gained by those students in the university examination, and later total is divided by 2.
- Result of the formula equaled into four grades:

Excellent: 76 and AboveGood: Between 66 to 75

• Satisfactory: Between 56 to 65

• Poor: 55 and Below 55

Evaluation of POs

IQAC prepares checklist to evaluate the attainment of POs. Heads of the department completed the checklist based on the PSOs given by the evaluator and on the overall performance of students. All heads hand-over this completed checklist to the IQAC. IQAC calculates the average of POs of each program, and it is communicated to the Principal.

Indirect Evaluation

The college considers several factors as measures to evaluate the attainment:

- Involvement of students in classroom activities, departmental level activities, inter-college, university-level activities and programs such as Avishkar competition, Debate, Elocution, English language quiz, etc.
- Regular attendance and interactions of students in the classes.
- Participation of students at the time of using student-centric teaching methods.
- Response of students in ICT classrooms, e-tests, and online classes
- Involvement of students while transacting cross-cutting issues through discussion, debate, quiz, guest lecture, etc.
- Students' voluntary involvement in organizing departmental activities.
- Contribution to organizing the college levels programs such as teachers' day, celebration of National and International Days, Republic and Independence Day, exhibitions and fairs, food festivals, etc.
- Involvement in Lead College activities and programs.
- Participation of students in committees such as Students Council, Library Committee, etc.
- Performance of students in formative tests.
- Regular use of the departmental library and college library

- There are total 38 computers used for academic purposes, whereas 12 computers used for administrative purposes, including office and teaching staff.
- Department of Hindi and Home Science are facilitated with the 43 Inches EGO Smart LED TV.
- Smart LED TV at the entry hall of Library to flash the News, online lectures and speeches.
- Department of Hindi and Home Science are made available the facility of Smart LED TV for screening.
- Open Stage: The College has spacious open Stage for the organization of college level programmes such as Annual Prize Distribution, Cultural Programmes etc.
- **Sports:** Department of Physical education has its separate room.

Response:

- The library is established in 1984 along with the establishment of the college and it is well furnished and adequate library covers an area of 378.0 sq. mt. spread over sections such as periodical section, reference section, Textbook section and Common Computer Facilitating Center (CCF).
- The major objective of the library as a source of information is to provide all necessary information to stakeholders within a time.
- ILMS: The Library has an adequate infrastructure and fully automated with ILMS entitled 'e-Granthalay 3.0' and 'Koha Library Management System 23.05' comprising modules for services such as Acquisition, Cataloging, Circulation, Serial Control, Library Administration, Daily transactions, Membership Services, etc. The attributes of the members are directly fetched into the ILMS database. The library is fully computerized. The entire database is updated frequently. This ILMS is enabled with Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC).
- **OPAC:** User accessibility is prioritized with all readers granted access to the Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC) in the library for searching of books by proper keywords. The issue and return of books are enabled by barcode scanning.
- e-Attendance & Register: The authorized users are issued barcode cards for identification and attendance. Moreover, entry register is also maintained.
- **Resources:** The library offers large numbers of reading materials, including textbooks 14588, reference books 15003, National journals 10, e-journals, and recreational Readings 21.
- **e-Resources:** From the last five years, the library has been a member of N-LIST and the National Digital Library (NDL). It helps to acquire access to an extensive electronic repository.
- MoU/Linkages: The library has 04 active Linkages.
- Reading Room is well furnished to accommodate 90 students at a time and provides a conducive environment for study. During examination periods, the reading room extends its working hours.
- CCF: Library offers common computer facilitating (CCF) center equipped with 07 computers

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providing internet access and online resources to all stakeholders.

- The library is under CCTV surveillance.
- Library Advisory Committee (LAC): The main objective of LAC is to decide and adopt policies for the library services and programmes of the library.
- Blog & Library Extension activities: The library has established a blog at for disseminating reliable information on day-to-day activities, extended activities like Exhibition of books, Book Review Competition, Best Reader Award etc. This blog is also providing access to e-books, college publications, digital library and previous exam question papers.

With the dynamic digital culture and Technologies, the institution is providing IT facilities to the students and faculty members. Moreover, emphasizing the demand of the stakeholders, the institution is frequently updating the IT facilities, such as Wi-Fi, bandwidth for internet connectivity, internetworking etc. by procuring recent technologies. The college follows IT Policy and looks after the updating of IT facilities.

To ensure interactive smart teaching and learning, the internet with sufficient bandwidth is essential. Moreover, the internet of sufficient bandwidth is procured for continuous internal evaluation through online platform of University Examinations, hands-on training, organization of webinars, FDPs, Seminars, Paper presentation etc.

IT Facilities:

- The college has deployed 54 computers including laptops with internet and LAN facilities in the departments.
- The Classrooms and Seminar hall are also equipped with ICT facilities.
- The Computer laboratories of the institution are equipped with 100 Mbps internet facility.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell having IT setup with 3 KVA UPS providing uninterrupted power back up for 8 Hours.
- 3 OS having EGOTEL 97 cm (43 inch) HD Ready LED Smart TV 20 W, 60 ZH, USB
- The college is utilizing as well as open access software such as Windows OS from 7 to 11, Tally Prime, SPSS etc.
- A separate Common Computer Facility (CCF) is available in the staff-room for teaching staff.
- **Meeting Bandwidth Demand:** To keep pace with the high bandwidth demand resulting from increased internet usage, the institute has procured one SKYLINK's Optical Fibre lines of 100 MBPS bandwidth. It is enhanced from 50 Mbps to 100 Mbps. Moreover, it is updated from wired connectivity to Optical Fiber Connectivity.
- The network is upgraded with 100 MBPS to 1 GBPS SKYLINK's router and networking switch and WiFi Access.
- There are 18 Printers and 06 LCD projectors for administrative and academic purpose.
- The 03 designated areas are Wi-Fi enabled
- Administrative offices are fully computerized with hardware and requisite softwares for office automation.
- Library has a central computer system with LAN and Internet connectivity.
- **ERP:** Automation of manual tasks through the implementation of the Biyani ERP System which aims to enhance administrative efficiency.
- To ensure security, the campus is covered with three high resolution CCTV vigilance systems.

As a woman's college the prime mission of this institution is to empower and enlighten women through academic excellence embedded with moral values to face challenges and thereby mould and lead successive generations. The college follows a unique approach when dealing with women students who belong to communities where they are married early. A gnawing issue that is found to be predominant is the hindrances encountered by the girls in realizing their higher education dreams. Economic, social and cultural factors play a regressive role, thus impeding their academic journey. The authorities and faculty members encourage the determination and interest of the married students to pursue their higher education.

Objectives:

- To create awareness of Women's Potential
- To develop their self-confidence
- To motivate them to develop entrepreneurial skills.
- To bring sense of equity and security among the girls.

For the women empowerment, gender equity and safety the Internal Complain Committee (ICC), Sexual Harassment Prevention committee, Women Empowerment Cell and Psychological Counseling Centre are continuously putting its efforts. Apart from this, most of the activities of Department of home Science are devoted to the same. Following initiatives are carried out for the woman empowerment, gender equity and safety:

Women Empowerment

The College strives for the empowerment of the women through education. The Departments like Home Science devotedly works for the woman empowerment through different activities.

- **Tailoring Course:** The College runs tailoring course in collaboration with Win InfoTech for the students. College has total 09 Sewing Machine. It helps girls to start their tailoring business at home.
- **Beauty Parlor Course:** The Beauty Parlor Course run by the Home Science department and it helps girls to be self-reliant by starting their own Beauty Parlor. Considering the demand of the girls, college has availed a separate room and instruments.
- Aari Works: The College provides the training of Aari work to design different blouses, and different kinds of clothes. The course converts the aesthetic sense of girls into business opportunities and invokes them to do part time job of Aari Work by taking admission to the course.
- **Mehandi Designing:** The *Mehndi* designing course gives enough scope to the artistic interest of the girls. Number of girl-students providing the paid service of *Mehndi* designing in marriage ceremonies. The course helps students
- Sari Ornamentation: The course Sari Ornamentation provides the skill of designing the saris. It's a self funded and self designed course for make students economically self-reliant.
- **Placement Cell:** Under the Placement Cell, college provides the facility to open Employment Card in campus. Apart from this it conducts a Job Fair in collaboration with ICICI. The recurrent job fairs give girls an opportunity of employability.
- College Annual Magazine: The College Annual Magazine titled *Asmita* gives exposure to girl students to express their thoughts. Their thoughts in the form of prose, poetry and creative writing make them more confident and courageous to put their views in explicit words.
- Creating and Developing E-Resources such as You Tube & Blog: The department of English organized a training programme of creating and developing E-Resources on YouTube and Blogs. It encouraged them for critical thinking and creative resource developing.
- **Skill-oriented Certificate Courses:** The College provides Skill Oriented Certificate Courses to make students self—reliant. Employability and Soft Skill Training Programme, Certificate Course in Data Entry, Employability enhancement and livelihood training programme etc create an ecosystem for the skills development.
- **Reel Making Competition:** The Reel-making Competition boost students to create audio-visual content on different platforms of social media. Some of the students are boosted from it and started acting as a career.

Gender Equity and Safety

- **Kanya Sukanya Award:** Kanya Sukanya Award is distinctive feature of the institution.
